KLE-Tech University and CherYsh have been working towards improving the educational standards of Shikshas through the Rural Innovation Through Education (RITE) Volunteer Programme. The student volunteers and faculty of KLE-Tech had expressed their interest to engage with the community beyond the Shikshas.

A two - day camp was thus planned in Jataga village with overnight stay in Haliyal. Fourty five students from various batches of Engineering, joined the camp accompanied by Ms. Sujatha and other faculty members. The students interacted with the villagers in batches. They spent time understanding and documenting the issues faced by the villagers, engaging in group discussions and comprehending the reality of rural India.

They spent the night at the lodging facility provided by Rural Self Employment Institute (RSETI)- Haliyal and had extensive discussions on the issues that they observed and came up with an action plan which can help in improving the condition of the village.

The two day camp helped to step up the association between KLE-Tech and CherYsh to the next level. By interacting directly with the community the students were able to get a first-hand knowledge of issues faced by people in rural areas and to apply their technical knowledge to come up with solutions. The process helped in designing the first steps for intervention in a resource poor village while creating values of social commitment and responsibility in the students.

CherYsh Shikshas work in tandem with the government schools and lean heavily on the guidance and support given by the teachers and school committee. As the next step of linking Shikshas to the school operations, two of CherYsh's earliest Shikshas in Jogankoppa village started working out of the government run primary school premises. We are looking forward to working out the same arrangement in more villages in the coming months.

CherYsh's projects get attention from various quarters

A host of livelihood activities ranging from woollen shawls, crochet work, spice powder making, sugar cane bud nursery and tailoring are being run by CherYsh's women groups in villages of Haliyal. These women led enterprises have been receiving a lot of attention and interest from various stakeholders in the recent months.

Senior officers from government departments such as Mr. Vasudeva Doddamani from the Department of Handlooms and Textiles , Mr. Mahesh Kuriannavar from Taluka Panchayat - Haliyal, Ms. Kavita Kalal from National Rural Livelihood Mission (NRLM) visited the villages and interacted with the women's groups . Officers from Deshpande Foundation- Hubballi and Social Alpha-Tata Trust visited the Shikshas and livelihood programmes to study the model and explore possibilities for partnerships. CherYsh 's team also visited the village of Ballarwada near Hubli to study the livelihood and education projects of Deshpande Foundation .

Founder Director of CherYsh America Foundation, Michael deSa and Maria deSa visited the villages of Haliyal and interacted with the learning facilitators, children who attend CherYsh Shikshas and women who run the livelihood enterprises. The visits have been encouraging and inspiring as they pave the way to future expansion and progress of projects.
